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
### Important safety instructions

Your projector is designed and tested to meet the latest standards for safety of information technology equipment. However, to ensure safe use of this product, it is important that you follow the instructions mentioned in this manual and marked on the product.

#### **Safety Instructions**

 Please read this manual before you operate your projector. Save it for future reference.



 Do not look straight at the projector lens during operation. The intense light beam may damage your eyes.



Refer servicing to qualified service personnel.



 Always open the lens shutter or remove the lens cap when the projector lamp is on.



In some countries, the line voltage is NOT stable. This projector is designed to operate safely within a mains voltage between 100 to 240 volts AC, but could fail if power cuts or surges of ±10 volts occur. In areas where the mains voltage may fluctuate or cut out, it is recommended that you connect your projector through a power stabilizer, surge protector or uninterruptible power supply (UPS).



6. Do not block the projection lens with any objects when the projector is under operation as this could cause the objects to become heated and deformed or even cause a fire. To temporarily turn off the lamp, press BLANK on the projector or remote control.



#### **Safety Instructions (Continued)**

 The lamp becomes extremely hot during operation. Allow the projector to cool for approximately 45 minutes prior to removing the lamp assembly for replacement.



 Do not operate lamps beyond the rated lamp life. Excessive operation of lamps beyond the rated life could cause them to break on rare occasions.



 Never replace the lamp assembly or any electronic components unless the projector is unplugged.



 Do not place this product on an unstable cart, stand, or table. The product may fall, sustaining serious damage.



11. Do not attempt to disassemble this projector. There are dangerous high voltages inside which may cause death if you should come into contact with live parts. The only user serviceable part is the lamp which has its own removable cover.

Under no circumstances should you ever undo or remove any other covers. Refer servicing only to suitably qualified professional service personnel.




When the projector is under operation, you may sense some heated air and odor from its ventilation grill.
 It is a normal phenomenon and not a product defect.

#### Safety Instructions (Continued)

- 13. Do not place this projector in any of the following environments.
  - Space that is poorly ventilated or confined. Allow at least 50 cm clearance from walls and free flow of air around the projector.
  - Locations where temperatures may become excessively high, such as the inside of a car with all windows rolled up.
  - Locations where excessive humidity, dust, or cigarette smoke may contaminate optical components, shorten the projector's life span and darken the image.



- Locations near fire alarms
- Locations with an ambient temperature above 40°C / 104°F
- Locations where the altitudes are higher than 3000 m (10000 feet).



- Do not block the ventilation holes.
  - Do not place this projector on a blanket, bedding or any other soft surface.
  - Do not cover this projector with a cloth or any other item.
  - Do not place inflammables near the projector.




If the ventilation holes are seriously obstructed, overheating inside the projector may result in a fire.

- 15. Always place the projector on a level, horizontal surface during operation.
  - Do not use if tilted at an angle of more than 10 degrees left to right, nor at angle of more than 15 degrees front to back. Using the projector when it is not fully horizontal may cause a malfunction of, or damage to, the lamp.



 Do not stand the projector on end vertically. Doing so may cause the projector to fall over, causing injury or resulting in damage to the projector.

17. Do not step on the projector or place any objects upon it. Besides probable physical damage to the projector, doing so may result in accidents and possible injury.





### Ceiling mounting the projector

We want you to have a pleasant experience using your BenQ projector, so we need to bring this safety matter to your attention to prevent possible damage to person and property.

If you intend to mount your projector on the ceiling, we strongly recommend that you use a proper fitting BenQ projector ceiling mount kit and that vou ensure it is securely and safely installed.

If you use a non-BenQ brand projector ceiling mount kit, there is a safety risk that the projector may fall from the ceiling due to an improper attachment through the use of the wrong gauge or length screws.

You can purchase a BenQ projector ceiling mount kit from the place you purchased your BenQ projector. BenQ recommends that you also purchase a separate Kensington lock compatible security cable and attach it securely to both the Kensington lock slot on the projector and the base of the ceiling mount bracket. This will perform the secondary role of restraining the projector should its attachment to the mounting bracket become loose.

#### Operating the LASER pointer

The Laser Pointer is a presentation aid for professionals. It emits red colored light when you press it and the indicator lights up red.

The laser beam is visible. It is necessary to press and hold LASER for continuous output.



Do not look into the laser light window or shine the laser light beam on yourself or others. See the warning messages on the back of the remote control prior to using it.


The laser pointer is not a toy. Parents should be mindful of the dangers of laser energy and keep this remote control out of the reach of children.

### Remote control effective range

Infra-Red (IR) remote control sensors are located on the front and the back of the projector. The remote control must be held at an angle within 30 degrees perpendicular to the projector's IR remote control sensors to function correctly. The distance between the remote control and the sensors should not exceed 8 meters (~ 26 feet).


Make sure that there are no obstacles between the remote control and the IR sensors on the projector that might obstruct the infra-red beam.

### Replacing the remote control batteries

- To open the battery cover, turn the remote control over to view its back, push on the finger grip on the cover and slide it up in the direction of the arrow as illustrated. The cover will slide off.
- 2. Remove any existing batteries (if necessary) and install two AAA batteries observing the battery polarities as indicated in the base of the battery compartment. Positive (+) goes to positive and negative (-) goes to negative.
- 3. Refit the cover by aligning it with the base and sliding it back down into position. Stop when it clicks into place.





- Avoid leaving the remote control and batteries in an excessive heat or humid environment like the kitchen, bathroom, sauna, sunroom or in a closed car.
- · Replace only with the same or equivalent type recommended by the battery manufacturer.
- Dispose of the used batteries according to the manufacturer's instructions and local environment regulations for your region.
- Never throw the batteries into a fire. There may be danger of an explosion.
- If the batteries are dead or if you will not be using the remote control for an extended period of time, remove the batteries to avoid damage to the remote control from possible battery leakage.


### Positioning your projector

### Choosing a location

Your projector is designed to be installed in one of four possible installation locations:

#### Front Table

Select this location with the projector placed on the table in front of the screen. This is the most common way to position the projector for quick setup and portability.




#### 2. Front Ceiling

Select this location with the projector suspended upside-down from the ceiling in front of the screen.

Purchase the BenQ Projector Ceiling Mount Kit from your dealer to mount your projector on the ceiling.

Set **Front Ceiling** in the **SYSTEM SETUP: Basic** > **Projector Position** menu after you turn the projector on.




#### 3. Rear Ceiling

Select this location with the projector suspended upside-down from the ceiling behind the screen.

Note that a special rear projection screen and the BenQ Projector Ceiling Mount Kit are required for this installation location.

Set **Rear Ceiling** in the **SYSTEM SETUP: Basic** > **Projector Position** menu after you turn the projector on.




#### 4. Rear Table

Select this location with the projector placed on the table behind the screen.

Note that a special rear projection screen is required.

Set **Rear Table** in the **SYSTEM SETUP: Basic** > **Projector Position** menu after you turn the projector on.




Your room layout or personal preference will dictate which installation location you select. Take into consideration the size and position of your screen, the location of a suitable power outlet, as well as the location and distance between the projector and the rest of your equipment.

### Obtaining a preferred projected image size

The distance from the projector lens to the screen, the zoom setting, and the video format each factors in the projected image size.

4:3 is the native aspect ratio of this projector. To be able to project a complete 16:9 (widescreen) aspect ratio image, the projector can resize and scale a widescreen image to the projector's native aspect width. This will result in a proportionally smaller height equivalent to 75% of the projector's native aspect height.



The projector should always be placed horizontally level (like flat on a table), and positioned directly perpendicular (90° right-angle square) to the horizontal center of the screen. This prevents image distortion caused by angled projections (or projecting onto angled surfaces).

If the projector is mounted on a ceiling, it must be mounted upside-down so that it projects at a slightly downward angle.

You can see from the diagrams on page 17, that this type of projection causes the bottom edge of the projected image to be vertically offset from the horizontal plane of the projector. When ceiling mounted, this refers to the top edge of the projected image.

If the projector is positioned further away from the screen, the projected image size increases, and the vertical offset also increases proportionately.

When determining the position of the screen and projector, you will need to account for both the projected image size and the vertical offset dimension, which are directly proportional to the projection distance.

BenQ has provided a table of 4:3-aspect-ratio screen sizes to assist you in determining the ideal location for your projector. There are two dimensions to consider, the perpendicular horizontal distance from the center of the screen (projection distance), and the vertical offset height of the projector from the horizontal edge of the screen (offset).

# How to determine the position of the projector for a given screen size

- 1. Select your screen size.
- Refer to the table on page 17 and find the closest match to your screen size in the left columns labelled "Screen Size". Using this value, look across this row to the right to find the corresponding average distance from screen value in the column labelled "Distance from Screen in mm". This is the projection distance.
- On that same row, look across to the right column and make note of the "Vertical
  offset in mm" value. This will determine the final vertical offset placement of the
  projector in relation to the edge of the screen.
- 4. The recommended position for the projector is aligned perpendicular to the horizontal center of the screen, at the distance from the screen determined in step 2 above, and offset by the value determined in step 3 above.

For example, if you are using an 120-inch screen, the recommended projection distance is 1481 mm and the vertical offset is 137 mm.

# How to determine the recommended screen size for a given distance

This method can be used for situations where you have purchased this projector and would like to know what screen size will fit in your room.

The maximum screen size is limited by the physical space available in your room.


- 1. Measure the distance between the projector and where you want to position the screen. This is the projection distance.
- 2. Refer to the table on page 17 and find the closest match to your measurement in the average distance from screen column labelled "Distance from Screen in mm". This is the projection distance.
- Using this value, look across that row to the left to find the corresponding "Screen Size" listed in that row. That is the projected image size of the projector at that projection distance.
- 4. On that same row, look across to the right column and make note of the "Vertical offset in mm" value. This will determine the final placement of the screen in relation to the horizontal plane of the projector.

For example, if your measured projection distance is 1.5 m (1500 mm), the closest match in the "Distance from Screen in mm" column is 1481 mm. Looking across this row shows that a 120" (about 3.0 m) screen is required.

If you place the projector in a different position (to that recommended), you will have to tilt it down or up to center the image on the screen. In these situations, some image distortion will occur. Use the Keystone function to correct the distortion. See "Correcting keystone" on page 28 for details.

### **Projection dimensions**


There is 3% tolerance among these numbers due to optical component variations.

BenQ recommends that if you intend to permanently install the projector, you should physically test the projection size and distance using the actual projector in situ before you permanently install it, so as to make allowance for this projector's optical characteristics. This will help you determine the exact mounting position so that it best suits your installation location.

### Connection

When connecting a signal source to the projector, be sure to:

- 1. Turn all equipment off before making any connections.
- 2. Use the correct signal cables for each source.
- Ensure the cables are firmly inserted.


### Connecting a computer or monitor

### Connecting a computer

The projector can connect to both IBM® compatibles and Macintosh® computers. A Mac adapter (an optional accessory) is needed if you are connecting legacy version Macintosh computers.

#### To connect the projector to a notebook or desktop computer:

- Take the supplied VGA cable and connect one end to the D-Sub output jack of the computer.
- 2. Connect the other end of the VGA cable to the **COMPUTER 1** or **COMPUTER 2** signal input jack on the projector.
- If you wish to make use of the projector (mixed mono) speakers in your presentations, take a suitable audio cable and connect one end of the cable to the audio output jack of the computer, and the other end to the AUDIO or AUDIO (L/R) jack of the projector.
- 4. If you wish and the AUDIO OUT jack is available on your projector, you can use another suitable audio cable and connect one end of the cable to the AUDIO OUT jack of the projector, and the other end to your external speakers (not supplied).
  - Once connected, the audio can be controlled by the projector On-Screen Display (OSD) menus. See "Audio Settings" on page 50 for details.



### Connecting a monitor

If you want to view your presentation close-up on a monitor as well as on the screen and the **MONITOR OUT** jack is available on your projector, you can connect the **MONITOR OUT** signal output jack on the projector to an external monitor following the instructions below:

#### To connect the projector to a monitor:

- Connect the projector to a computer as described in "Connecting a computer" on page 19.
- 2. Take a suitable VGA cable (only one supplied) and connect one end of the cable to the D-Sub input jack of the video monitor.
  - Or if your monitor is equipped with a DVI input jack, take a VGA to DVI-A cable and connect the DVI end of the cable to the DVI input jack of the video monitor.
- 3. Connect the other end of the cable to the **MONITOR OUT** jack on the projector.
- The D-Sub output only works when an appropriate D-Sub input is made to the COMPUTER 1 jack.
  - If you wish to use this connection method when the projector is in standby mode, make sure the Standby Monitor Out function is turned on in the SYSTEM SETUP: Advanced menu. See "Standby Monitor Out" on page 50 for details.

### Connecting video source devices

You need only connect the projector to a video source device using just one of the connecting methods, however each provides a different level of video quality. The method you choose will most likely depend upon the availability of matching terminals on both the projector and the video source device as described below:

#### Connecting audio

The projector has two built-in mono speakers which are designed to provide basic audio functionality accompanying data presentations for business purposes only. They are not designed for, nor intended for stereo audio reproduction use as might be expected in home theater or home cinema applications. Any stereo audio input (if provided), is mixed into a common mono audio output through the projector speakers.

If you have a separate sound system, you will most likely want to connect the audio output of your video source device to that sound system, instead of to the mono audio projector. The audio connections illustrated on page 18 are provided for informational purposes only. You need not connect audio to the projector if there is an alternate sound system available, or if audio is not required.

#### Connecting an HDMI device

You should use an HDMI cable when making connection between the projector and HDMI devices.

#### To connect the projector to an HDMI device:

- Take an HDMI cable and connect one end to the HDMI-output port of the video device.
- 2. Connect the other end of the cable to the **HDMI**-input port on the projector.
- In the unlikely event that you connect the projector to a DVD player via the projector's HDMI input and the projected picture displays wrong colors, please change the color space to YUV. See "Changing Color Space" on page 29 for details.
  - The projector is only capable of playing mixed mono audio, even if a stereo audio input is connected. See "Connecting audio" on page 20 for details.
  - . The HDMI input port is only available on the MP776 ST.

### Connecting a Component Video source device

Examine your video source device to determine if it has a set of unused Component Video output jacks available:

- If so, you can continue with this procedure.
- If not, you will need to reassess which method you can use to connect to the device.

#### To connect the projector to a Component Video source device:

- Take a Component Video to VGA (D-Sub) adapter cable or Component Video cable
  and connect the end with 3 RCA type connectors to the Component Video output
  jacks of the video source device. Match the color of the plugs to the color of the jacks;
  green to green, blue to blue, and red to red.
- Connect the other end of the Component Video to VGA (D-Sub) adapter cable (with a D-Sub type connector) to the COMPUTER 1, or COMPUTER 2 jack on the projector.
- If you wish to make use of the projector (mixed mono) speakers in your presentations, take a suitable audio cable and connect one end of the cable to the audio output jack of the device, and the other end to the AUDIO or AUDIO (L/R) jack of the projector.
- 4. If you wish and the AUDIO OUT jack is available on your projector, you can use another suitable audio cable and connect one end of the cable to the AUDIO OUT jack of the projector, and the other end to your external speakers (not supplied). Once connected, the audio can be controlled by the projector On-Screen Display (OSD) menus. See "Audio Settings" on page 50 for details.
- The projector is only capable of playing mixed mono audio, even if a stereo audio input is connected. See "Connecting audio" on page 20 for details.
  - If the selected video image is not displayed after the projector is turned on and the correct video source has been selected, check that the video source device is turned on and operating correctly. Also check that the signal cables have been connected correctly.

### Connecting an S-Video/Composite Video source device

Examine your video source device to determine if it has an unused S-Video/Video output jack available:

- If it has both jacks, use the S-Video output jack for connection as the S-Video terminal provides better picture quality than the Video terminal.
- If it has either of the output jack, you can also continue with this procedure.
- If not, you will need to reassess which method you can use to connect to the device.

#### To connect the projector to an S-Video/Video source device:

- Take an S-Video/Video cable and connect one end to the S-Video/Video output jack of the Video source device.
- Connect the other end of the S-Video/Video cable to the S-VIDEO/VIDEO jack on the projector.
- 3. If you wish to make use of the projector (mixed mono) speakers in your presentations, take a suitable audio cable and connect one end of the cable to the audio output jack of the device, and the other end to the AUDIO or AUDIO (L/R) jack of the projector.
- 4. If you wish and the AUDIO OUT jack is available on your projector, you can use another suitable audio cable and connect one end of the cable to the AUDIO OUT jack of the projector, and the other end to your external speakers (not supplied). Once connected, the audio can be controlled by the projector On-Screen Display (OSD) menus. See "Audio Settings" on page 50 for details.
- The projector is only capable of playing mixed mono audio, even if a stereo audio input is connected. See "Connecting audio" on page 20 for details.
  - If the selected video image is not displayed after the projector is turned on and the correct video source has been selected, check that the video source device is turned on and operating correctly. Also check that the signal cables have been connected correctly.

### Operation

### Starting up the projector

- Plug the power cord into the projector and into a power outlet. Turn on the power outlet switch (where fitted). Check that the **POWER indicator light** on the projector lights orange after power has been applied.
- Open the lens cover. If it is closed, it could become deformed due to the heat produced by the projection lamp.






- 3. Press **②** Power on the projector or remote control to start the projector. As soon as the lamp lights up, a "Power On Tone" will be heard. The POWER indicator light flashes green and stays green when the projector is on. The start up procedure takes about 30 seconds. In the later stage of start up, a startup logo is projected.
  - (If necessary) Rotate the focus ring to adjust the image clearness.
  - To turn of the ring tone, see "Turning off the Power on/off ring tone" on page 39 for details.
- If the projector is activated for the first time, select your OSD language following the onscreen instructions.
- If you are prompted for a password, press the arrow keys to enter a six-digit password. See "Utilizing the password function" on page 26 for details.
- 6. Switch all of the connected equipment on.
- The projector will start to search for input signals. The current input signal being scanned displays in the upper left corner of the screen.

If the projector doesn't detect a valid signal, the message "No Signal" will continue displaying until an input signal is found.

You can also press **SOURCE** on the projector or remote control to select your desired input signal. See "Switching input signal" on page 29 for details.



If the projector is still hot from previous activity, it will run the cooling fan for approximately 90 seconds before energizing the lamp.



If the frequency/resolution of the input signal exceeds the projector's operating range, you will see the message "Out of Range" displayed on a blank screen. Please change to an input

signal which is compatible with the projector's resolution or set the input signal to a lower setting. See "Timing chart" on page 63 for details.

### Adjusting the projected image


### Adjusting the projection angle

The projector is equipped with 1 quick-release adjuster foot and 1 rear adjuster foot. These adjusters change the image height and projection angle. To adjust the projector:

- Press the quick-release button and lift the front of the projector. Once the image is positioned where you want it, release the quick-release button to lock the foot in position.
- 2. Screw the rear adjuster foot to fine-tune the horizontal angle.

To retract the foot, hold up the projector while pressing the quick-release button, then slowly lower the projector. Screw the rear adjuster foot in a reverse direction.

If the projector is not placed on a flat surface or the screen and the projector are not perpendicular to each other, the projected image becomes trapezoidal. To correct this situation, see "Correcting keystone" on page 28 for details.




Do not look into the lens while the lamp is on. The strong light from the lamp may cause damage to your eyes.

Be careful when you press the quick-release button as it is close to the exhaust vent where hot air comes from.

### Auto-adjusting the image

In some cases, you may need to optimize the picture quality. To do this, press **AUTO** on the projector or remote control. Within 3 seconds, the built-in Intelligent Auto Adjustment function will re-adjust the values of Frequency and Clock to provide the best picture quality.


The current source information will be displayed in the corner of the screen for 3 seconds.



- CT.
- The screen will be blank while AUTO is functioning.
  - This function is only available when PC signal (analog RGB) is selected.

### Fine-tuning the image clarity

If needed, sharpen the image by rotating the focus ring.



### Using the menus

The projector is equipped with On-Screen Display (OSD) menus for making various adjustments and settings.

Below is the overview of the OSD menu.



The following example describes how to set the OSD language.

1. Press **Menu/Exit** on the projector or remote control to turn the OSD menu on.



Press ▼ to highlight **Language** and press ◀ / ▶ to select a preferred language.



 Use ◀/▶ to highlight the SYSTEM SETUP: Basic menu.



 Press Menu/Exit twice\* on the projector or remote control to leave and save the settings.

> \*The first press leads you back to the main menu and the second press closes the OSD menu.

### Securing the projector

### Using a security cable lock

The projector has to be installed in a safe place to prevent theft. Otherwise, purchase a lock, such as the Kensington lock, to secure the projector. You can locate a Kensington lock slot on the rear side of the projector. See item 11 on page 9 for details.

A Kensington security cable lock is usually a combination of key(s) and the lock. Refer to the lock's documentation for finding out how to use it.

### Utilizing the password function

For security purposes and to help prevent unauthorized use, the projector includes an option for setting up password security. The password can be set through the On-Screen Display (OSD) menu.



WARNING: You will be inconvenienced if you activate the password functionality and subsequently forget the password. Print out this manual (if necessary) and write the password you used in this manual, and keep the manual in a safe place for later recall.

### Setting a password



( Tonce a password has been set and the power on lock is activated, the projector cannot be used unless the correct password is entered every time the projector is started.

- 1. Open the OSD menu and go to the **SYSTEM SETUP: Advanced** > **Security Settings** menu. Press Mode/Enter. The Security Settings page displays.
- 2. Highlight **Power On Lock** and select press **On** by pressing  $\triangleleft/\triangleright$ .
- 3. As pictured to the right, the four arrow keys ( $\triangle$ ,  $\triangleright$ ,  $\nabla$ ,  $\triangleleft$ ) respectively represent 4 digits (1, 2, 3, 4). According to the password you desire to set, press the arrow keys to enter six digits for the password.
- 4. Confirm the new password by re-entering the new password.

Once the password is set, the OSD menu returns to the **Security Settings** page.





/INPORTANT: The digits being input will display as asterisks on-screen. Write your selected password down here in this manual in advance or right after the password is entered so that it is available to you should you ever forget it.

Keep this manual in a safe place.

To leave the OSD menu, press Menu/Exit.

### If you forget the password

If the password function is activated, you will be asked to enter the six-digit password every time you turn on the projector. If you enter the wrong password, the password error message as pictured to the right displays lasting for 3 seconds, and the **INPUT PASSWORD** message follows. You can retry by entering another six-digit password, or if you did not record the password in



this manual, and you absolutely do not remember it, you can use the password recall procedure. See "Entering the password recall procedure" on page 27 for details.

If you enter an incorrect password 5 times in succession, the projector will automatically shut down in a short time.

### Entering the password recall procedure

- Press and hold **AUTO** on the projector or remote control for 3 seconds. The projector will display a coded number on the screen.
- 2. Write down the number and turn off your projector.
- Seek help from the local BenQ service center to decode the number. You may be required to provide proof of purchase documentation to verify that you are an authorized user of the projector.



### Changing the password

- Open the OSD menu and go to the SYSTEM SETUP: Advanced> Security Settings > Change Password menu.
- 2. Press Mode/Enter. The message "INPUT CURRENT PASSWORD" displays.
- 3. Enter the old password.
  - i. If the password is correct, another message "INPUT NEW PASSWORD" displays.
  - ii. If the password is incorrect, the password error message displays lasting for three seconds, and the message "INPUT CURRENT PASSWORD" displays for your retry. You can press Menu/Exit to cancel the change or try another password.
- 4. Enter a new password.

IMPORTANT: The digits being input will display as asterisks on-screen. Write your selected password down here in this manual in advance or right after the password is entered so that it is available to you should you ever forget it.

Keep this manual in a safe place.

- 5. Confirm the new password by re-entering the new password.
- You have successfully assigned a new password to the projector. Remember to enter the new password next time the projector is started.
- 7. To leave the OSD menu, press **Menu/Exit.**

### Disabling the password function

To disable password protection, go back to the **SYSTEM SETUP:** Advanced > Security **Settings > Power On Lock** menu after opening the OSD menu system. Press **Mode/Enter.** The message "INPUT PASSWORD" displays. Enter the current password.

i. If the password is correct, the OSD menu returns to the Security Settings page. Press ▼ to highlight Power On Lock and press ◄/▶ to select Off. You will not have to enter the password next time when turning on the projector. If the password is incorrect, the password error message displays lasting for three seconds, and the message "INPUT PASSWORD" displays for your retry. You can press Menu/Exit to cancel the change or try another password.

Though the password function is disabled, you need to keep the old password in hand should you ever need to re-activate the password function by entering the old password.

### Correcting keystone

Keystoning refers to the situation where the projected image is noticeably wider at either the top or bottom. It occurs when the projector is not perpendicular to the screen.

To correct this, besides adjusting the height of the projector, if you are using the MP776 ST and would like the projector to automatically correct image keystoning, be sure the **Auto Keystone** function in the **DISPLAY** menu is **On**.

Or you will need to manually correct it following ONE of these steps.

· Using the remote control

Press \_\_ / \_\_ on the projector or remote control to display the Keystone correction page. Press \_\_ to correct keystoning at the top of the image. Press \_\_ to correct keystoning at the bottom of the image.

- Using the OSD menu
- Press Menu/Exit and then press ◀/▶ until the DISPLAY menu is highlighted.
- Press ▼ to highlight Keystone and press Mode/ Enter. The Keystone correction page displays.
- 3. Press 

  to correct keystoning at the top of the image. Press 

  to correct keystoning at the bottom of the image.

### Switching input signal


The projector can be connected to multiple devices at the same time. However, it can only display one full screen at a time. When starting up, the projector automatically search for the available signals.


Be sure the **Quick Auto Search** function in the **SOURCE** menu is **On** (which is the default of this projector) if you want the projector to automatically search for the signals.


You can also manually cycle through the available input signals.

- Press **SOURCE** on the projector or remote control. A source selection bar displays.
- Press ▲ /▼ until your desired signal is selected and press Mode/Enter.

Once detected, the selected source information will display at the corner of the screen for seconds. If there is multiple equipment connected to the projector, repeat steps 1-2 to search for another signal.

#### **Changing Color Space**

In the unlikely event that you connect the projector to a DVD player via the projector's **HDMI** input and the projected picture displays wrong colors, please change the color space to **YUV**.

#### To do this:

- 1. Press **Menu/Exit** and then press **◄/▶** until the **SOURCE** menu is highlighted.
- Press ▼ to highlight Color Space Conversion and press ◄/► to select a suitable color space.
- This function is only available when the HDMI-input port is in use.
  - · The HDMI-input port is only available on the MP776 ST.

### Magnifying and searching for details

If you need to find the details on the projected picture, magnify the picture. Use the direction arrow keys for navigating the picture.

- · Using the remote control
- Press Digital Zoom+/- to display the Zoom bar. Press Digital Zoom+ to magnify the center of the picture. Press the key repeatedly until the picture size is suitable for your need.
- Use the directional arrows (▲, ▼, ◄, ►) on the projector or remote control to navigate the picture.
- To restore the picture to its original size, press AUTO. You can also press Digital Zoom-.
  When the key is pressed again, the picture is further reduced until it is restored to the original size.
- Using the OSD menu
- Press Menu/Exit and then press ◀ /▶ until the DISPLAY menu is highlighted.
- Press ▼ to highlight **Digital Zoom** and press Mode/Enter. The Zoom bar displays.
- 3. Press  $\triangle$  repeatedly to magnify the picture to a desired size.
- To navigate the picture, press Mode/Enter to switch to the panning mode and press the directional arrows (▲, ▼, ◄, ▶) on the projector or remote control to navigate the picture.
- To reduce size of the picture, press **Mode/Enter** to switch back to the zoom in/out function, and press **AUTO** to restore the picture to its original size. You can also press ▼ repeatedly until it is restored to the original size.


### Selecting the aspect ratio

The "aspect ratio" is the ratio of the image width to the image height. Most analog TV and some computers are in 4:3 ratio, and digital TV and DVDs are usually in 16:9 ratio.


With the advent of digital signal processing, digital display devices like this projector can dynamically stretch and scale the image output to a different aspect than that of the image input signal.

To change the projected picture ratio (no matter what aspect the source is):

- Using the remote control
- 1. Press **ASPECT** to show the current setting.
- Press ASPECT repeatedly to select an aspect ratio to suit the format of the video signal and your display requirements.
- Using the OSD menu
- Press MENU/EXIT and then press ◀ / ▶ until the DISPLAY menu is highlighted.




The picture can only be navigated after it is magnified. You can further magnify the picture while searching for details.




- 2. Press ▼ to highlight **Aspect Ratio**.
- Press ◀/► to select an aspect ratio to suit the format of the video signal and your display requirements.

### About the aspect ratio


- In the pictures below, the black portions are inactive areas and the white portions are active areas.
  - · OSD menus can be displayed on those unused black areas.
  - 1. **Auto:** Scales an image proportionally to fit the projector's native resolution in its horizontal or vertical width. This is suitable for the incoming image which is neither in 4:3 nor 16:9 and you want to make most use of the screen without altering the image's aspect ratio.




4:3: Scales an image so that it is displayed in the center of the screen with a 4:3 aspect ratio. This is most suitable for 4:3 images like some computer monitors, standard definition TV and 4:3 aspect DVD movies, as it displays them without aspect alteration.



2. Real: The image is projected as its original resolution, and resized to fit within the display area. For input signals with lower resolutions, the projected image will display smaller than if resized to full screen. You could adjust the zoom setting or move the projector towards the screen to increase the image size if necessary. You may also need to refocus the projector after making these adjustments.



4. **16:9**: Scales an image so that it is displayed in the center of the screen with a 16:9 aspect ratio. This is most suitable for images which are already in a 16:9 aspect, like high definition TV, as it displays them without aspect alteration.



### Optimizing the image

### **Using Wall Color**

In the situation where you are projecting onto a colored surface such as a painted wall which may not be white, the Wall Color feature can help correct the projected picture's colors to prevent possible color difference between the source and projected pictures.


To use this function, go to the **DISPLAY** > **Wall Color** menu and press ◀/▶ to select a color which is closest to the color of the projection surface. There are several precalibrated colors to choose from: **Light Yellow**, **Pink**, **Light Green**, **Blue**, and **Blackboard**.

### Selecting a picture mode

The projector is preset with several predefined picture modes so that you can choose one to suit your operating environment and input signal picture type.

To select an operation mode that suits your need, you can follow one of the following steps.

- Press Mode/Enter on the projector or remote control repeatedly until your desired mode is selected.
- Go to the PICTURE > Picture Mode menu and press ◀/▶ to select a desired mode.




- 2. **Presentation mode (Default):** Is designed for presentations. The brightness is emphasized in this mode to match PC and notebook coloring.
- sRGB mode: Maximizes the purity of RGB colors to provide true-to-life images regardless of brightness setting. It is most suitable for viewing photos taken with an sRGB compatible and properly calibrated camera, and for viewing PC graphic and drawing applications such as AutoCAD.
- Cinema mode: Is appropriate for playing colorful movies, video clips from digital cameras or DVs through the PC input for best viewing in a blackened (little light) environment.
- 5. **User 1/User 2 mode**: Recalls the settings customized based on the current available picture modes. See "Setting the User 1/User 2 mode" on page 32 for details.

### Setting the User 1/User 2 mode

There are two user-definable modes if the current available picture modes are not suitable for your need. You can use one of the picture modes (except the **User 1/2**) as a starting point and customize the settings.

- 1. Press **Menu/Exit** to open the On-Screen Display (OSD) menu.
- 2. Go to the **PICTURE** > **Picture Mode** menu.
- Press ◀/▶ to select User 1 or User 2.
- Press ▼ to highlight Reference Mode.
- This function is only available when User 1 or User 2 mode is selected up in the Picture Mode sub-menu item.
  - 5. Press **◄/▶** to select a picture mode that is closest to your need.



- 6. Press ▼ to select a menu item to be changed and adjust the value with ◀ / ▶ . See "Fine-tuning the image quality in user modes" below for details.
- 7. When all settings have been done, highlight **Save Settings** and press **Mode/Enter** to store the settings.
- 8. The confirmation message "Setting Saved" displays.

### Fine-tuning the image quality in user modes

According to the detected signal type, there are some user-definable functions available when **User 1** or **User 2** is selected. Based on your needs, you can make adjustments to these functions by highlighting them and pressing ◀/▶ on the projector or remote control.

#### **Adjusting Brightness**

The higher the value, the brighter the image. And the lower the setting, the darker the image. Adjust this control so the black areas of the image appear just as black and that detail in the dark areas is visible.







#### **Adjusting Contrast**

The higher the value, the greater the contrast. Use this to set the peak white level after you have previously adjusted the Brightness setting to suit your selected input and viewing environment.







#### **Adjusting Color**

Lower setting produces less saturated colors. If the setting is too high, colors on the image will be overpowering, which makes the image unrealistic.

#### **Adjusting Tint**

The higher the value, the more reddish the picture becomes. The lower the value, the more greenish the picture becomes.

### **Adjusting Sharpness**

The higher the value, the sharper the picture becomes. The lower the value, the softer the picture becomes.

#### **Adjusting Brilliant Color**

This feature utilizes a new color-processing algorithm and system level enhancements to enable higher brightness while providing truer, more vibrant colors in picture. It enables a greater than 50% brightness increase in mid-tone images, which are common in video and natural scenes, so the projector reproduces images in realistic and true colors. If you prefer images with that quality, select **On**. If you don't need it, select **Off**.

**On** is the default and recommended selection for this projector. When **Off** is selected, the **Color Temperature** function is not available.

#### Selecting a color temperature

The options available for color temperature\* settings vary according to the signal type selected.

- T1: With the highest color temperature, T1 makes the image appear the most bluish white than other settings.
- 2. **T2:** Makes images appear bluish white.
- 3. T3: Maintains normal colorings for white.
- 4. **T4:** Makes images appear reddish white.

#### \*About color temperatures:

There are many different shades that are considered to be "white" for various purposes. One of the common methods of representing white color is known as the "color temperature". A white color with a low color temperature appears to be reddish white. A white color with a high color temperature appears to have more blue in it.

#### 3D Color Management

In most installation situations, color management will not be necessary, such as in classroom, meeting room, or lounge room situations where lights remain on, or where building external windows allow daylight into the room.

Only in permanent installations with controlled lighting levels such as boardrooms, lecture theaters, or home theaters, should color management be considered. Color management provides fine color control adjustment to allow for more accurate color reproduction, should you require it.

Proper color management can only be achieved under controlled and reproducible viewing conditions. You will need to use a colorimeter (color light meter), and provide a set of suitable source images to measure color reproduction. These tools are not provided with the projector, however, your projector supplier should be able to provide you with suitable guidance, or even an experienced professional installer.

The Color Management provides six sets (RGBCMY) of colors to be adjusted. When you select each color, you can independently adjust its range and saturation according to your preference.

If you have purchased a test disc which contains various color test patterns and can be used to test the color presentation on monitors, TVs, projectors, etc, you can project any image from the disc on the screen and enter the **3D Color Management** menu to make adjustments.

To adjust the settings:


- 1. Go to the **PICTURE** menu and highlight **3D Color Management**.
- Press Mode/Enter on the projector or remote control and the 3D Color Management page displays.
- Highlight Primary Color and press ◀/► to select a color from among Red, Yellow, Green, Cyan, Blue, or Magenta.

Press ▼ to highlight Hue and press ◄ /▶ to select its range. Increase in the range will
include colors consisted of more proportions of its two adjacent colors.

Please refer to the illustration to the right for how the colors relate to each other.

For example, if you select Red and set its range at 0, only pure red in the projected picture will be selected. Increasing its range will include red close to yellow and red close to magenta.

5. Press ▼ to highlight **Saturation** and adjust its values to your preference by pressing ◀ /▶ . Every adjustment made will reflect to the image immediately.



For example, if you select Red and set its value at 0, only the saturation of pure red will be affected.

- Saturation is the amount of that color in a video picture. Lower settings produce less saturated colors; a setting of "0" removes that color from the image entirely. If the saturation is too high, that color will be overpowering and unrealistic.
  - Press ▼ to highlight Gain and adjust its values to your preference by pressing ◀ / ▶.
     The contrast level of the primary color you select will be affected. Every adjustment made will reflect to the image immediately.
  - 7. Repeat steps 3 to 6 for other color adjustments.
  - 8. Make sure you have made all of the desired adjustments.
  - 9. Press **Menu/Exit** to exit and save the settings.

### Setting the presentation timer

Presentation timer can indicate the presentation time on the screen to help you achieve better time management when giving presentations. Follow these steps to utilize this function:

- Press Timer Set up on the remote control or go to the SYSTEM SETUP: Basic > Presentation Timer menu and press Mode/Enter to display the Presentation Timer page.
- Highlight Timer Period and decide the time period by pressing ◀/▶. The length of time can be set from 1 to 5 minutes in 1-minute increments and 5 to 240 minutes in 5-minute increments.



- [7] If the timer is already on, the timer will restart whenever the Timer Period is reset.
  - Press ▼ to highlight Timer Display and choose if you want the timer to show up on the screen by pressing ◀/►.

Selection	Description
Always	Displays the timer on screen throughout the presentation time.
1 min/2 min/3 min	Displays the timer on screen in the last 1/2/3 minute(s).
Never	Hides the timer throughout the presentation time.

4. Press  $\blacktriangledown$  to highlight **Timer Position** and set the timer position by pressing  $\blacktriangleleft/\blacktriangleright$ .

 Press ▼ to highlight Timer Counting Direction and select your desired counting direction by pressing ◀ / ▶ .

Selection	Description	
Count Up	Increases from 0 to the preset time.	
Count Down	Decreases from the preset time to 0.	

- 6. Press ▼ to highlight **Sound Reminder** and decide if you want to activate sound reminder by pressing ◀ / ▶. If you select **On**, a double beep sound will be heard at the last 30 seconds of counting down/up, and a triple beep sound will be produced when the timer is up.
- To activate the presentation timer, press ▼ and press ◄ /► to highlight On and press Mode/Enter.
- 8. A confirmation message displays. Highlight **Yes** and press **Mode/Enter** on the projector or remote control to confirm. You will see the message "**Timer is On**" displaying on the screen. The timer starts counting when the timer is on.

#### To cancel the timer, perform the following steps:

Using the remote control

Press **Timer On** and press **◄** / ▶ to highlight **Off** and press **Mode/Enter**.

- · Using the OSD menu
- Go to the SYSTEM SETUP: Basic > Presentation Timer menu and highlight Off. Press Mode/Enter. A confirmation message displays.
- Highlight Yes and press Mode/Enter to confirm. You will see the message "Timer is Off" displaying on the screen.

#### How to use the Timer On key?

**Timer On** is a multi-functional kev.

- If the presentation timer is off, pressing this key displays a confirmation message. You can decide whether to activate the timer or not by following the on-screen instruction.
- If the timer is already on, pressing this key displays a confirmation message. You can decide whether to restart, continue or turn off the timer by following the on-screen instruction.



# Freezing the image

Press **FREEZE** on the remote control to freeze the image. The word "**FREEZE**" will display in the upper left corner of the screen. To release the function, press any key on the projector or remote control.

Even if an image is frozen on the screen, the pictures are running on the video or other device. If the connected devices have active audio output, you will still hear the audio even though the image is frozen onscreen.




# Hiding the image

In order to draw the audience's full attention to the presenter, you can use **BLANK** on the projector or remote control to hide the screen image. The word "**BLANK**" appears in the corner of the screen while the image is hidden. When this function is activated with an audio input connected, the audio can still be heard.

You can set the blank time in the **SYSTEM SETUP: Basic** > **Blank Timer** menu to let the projector return the image automatically after a period of time when there is no action taken on the blank screen. The length of time can be set from 5 to 30 minutes in 5-minute increments.

If the preset time spans are not suitable for your personation, select **Disable**.

No matter **Blank Timer** is activated or not, you can press most of the keys on the projector or remote control to restore the picture.




Do not block the projection lens from projecting as this could cause the blocking object to become heated and deformed or even cause a fire.

# **Utilizing FAQ function**

The **INFORMATION** menu contains possible solutions to problems regarding image quality, installation, special feature operation and service information.

To get the FAQ information:

- Press ◀/② on the projector or remote control or press Menu/Exit to open the OSD menu and press ◀/▶ to highlight the INFORMATION menu.
- Press ▼ to select FAQ-Image and Installation or FAO-Features and Service.
- 3. Press Mode/Enter.
- Press ▲/▼ to select a problem and press Mode/ Enter for possible solutions.
- To exit the OSD menu, press Menu/Exit.




## Locking control keys

With the control keys on the projector locked, you can prevent your projector settings from being changed accidentally (by children, for example). When the **Panel Key Lock** is on, no control keys on the projector will operate except **(b) Power**.

- Press ►/n on the projector or remote control or go to the SYSTEM SETUP: Basic > Panel Key Lock menu, and select On by pressing ◄/► on the projector or remote control. A confirmation message displays.
- 2. Highlight **Yes** and press **Mode/Enter** to confirm.

To release panel key lock, press and hold  $\triangleright$  /  $\widehat{\mathbf{h}}$  on the remote control or projector for 3 seconds.



You can also use the remote control to enter the **SYSTEM SETUP: Basic > Panel Key Lock** menu and press  $\blacktriangleleft$  / $\blacktriangleright$  to select **Off**.

- Keys on the remote control are still active when panel key lock is enabled.
  - If you press Power to turn off the projector without disabling panel key lock, the projector will still be in locked status the next time it is turned on.

# Operating in a high altitude environment

We recommend you use the **High Altitude Mode** when your environment is between 1500 m −3000 m above sea level, and ambient temperature is between 0°C−35°C.



⚠ Do not use the High Altitude Mode if your altitude is between 0 m and 1500 m and ambient temperature is between 0°C and 35°C. The projector will be over cooled, if you turn the mode on under such a condition.

To activate the **High Altitude Mode**:

- 1. Press **Menu/Exit** and then press **◄/▶** until the **SYSTEM SETUP: Advanced** menu is
- 2. Press ▼ to highlight **High Altitude Mode** and press ◀ / ▶ select **On**. A confirmation message displays.
- Highlight Yes and press Mode/Enter.

Operation under "High Altitude Mode" may cause a higher decibel operating noise level because of increased fan speed necessary to improve overall system cooling and performance.

If you use this projector under other extreme conditions excluding the above, it may display auto shut-down symptoms, which is designed to protect your projector from over-heating. In cases like this, you should switch to High Altitude mode to solve these symptoms. However, this is not to state that this projector can operate under any and all harsh or extreme conditions.

## Adjusting the sound

The sound adjustments made as below will have an effect on the projector speakers. Be sure you have made a correct connection to the projector audio input. See "Connection" on page 18 for how the audio input is connected.

### Muting the sound

To temporarily turn off the sound:

- 1. Press **Menu/Exit** and then press **◄/▶** until the **SYSTEM SETUP: Advanced** menu is highlighted.
- 2. Press ▼ to highlight Audio Settings and press Mode/Enter. The Audio Settings page displays.
- 3. Highlight **Mute** and press  $\triangleleft/\triangleright$  to select **On**.

### Adjusting the sound level

To adjust the sound level, press **Volume +/-** on the remote control, or:

- 1. Repeat steps 1-2 above.
- 2. Press **▼** to highlight **Volume** and press **◄**/**▶** to select a desired sound level.

### Turning off the Power on/off ring tone

To turn off the ring tone:

- 1. Repeat steps 1-2 above.
- Press  $\nabla$  to highlight **Power on/off ring tone** and press  $\triangleleft$ / $\triangleright$  to select **Off**.
- The only way to change Power on/off ring tone is setting On or Off here. Setting the sound mute or changing the sound level will not affect the Power on/off ring tone.

# Personalizing the projector menu display


The On-Screen Display (OSD) menus can be set according to your preferences. The following settings do not affect the projection settings, operation, or performance.

- Menu Display Time in the SYSTEM SETUP: Basic > Menu Settings menu sets the length of time the OSD will remain active after your last key press. The time length ranges from 5 to 30 seconds in 5-second increments. Use ◀/▶ to select a suitable time.
- Menu Position in the SYSTEM SETUP: Basic > Menu Settings menu sets the OSD position in five locations. Use 

  / to select a preferred position.
- Splash Screen in the SYSTEM SETUP: Basic menu sets a preferred logo screen to be displayed during projector start-up. Use 
   ✓ / ➤ to select a screen.

# Controlling the projector through a Lan environment

**Lan Control Settings** allow you to manage the projector from a computer using a web browser when the computer and the projector are properly connected to the same local area network.



### Configuring the Lan Control Settings

## If you are in a DHCP environment:

- Take a RJ45 cable and connect one end to the RJ45 LAN input jack of the projector and the other end to the RJ45 port.
- Press Menu/Exit and then press 

   until the SYSTEM SETUP: Advanced menu is highlighted.
- Press ▼ to highlight Lan Control Settings and press Mode/Enter. The Lan Control Settings page displays.
- 4. Press ▼ to highlight **Control By** and press ◀/▶ to select **RJ45**.
- 5. Press  $\nabla$  to highlight **DHCP** and press  $\triangleleft$ / $\triangleright$  to select **On**.
- 6. Press ▼ to highlight **Apply** and press **Mode/Enter**.
- Re-enter the Lan Control Settings page. The Projector IP Address, Subnet Mask, Default Gateway, and DNS Server settings will be displayed. Note down the IP address displayed in the Projector IP Address row.
- If the Projector IP Address still does not display, contact your ITS administrator.

#### If you are in a non-DHCP environment:

- 1. Repeat steps 1-4 above.
- 2. Press ▼ to highlight **DHCP** and press ◀/▶ to select **Off**.
- Contact your ITS administrator for information on the Projector IP Address, Subnet Mask, Default Gateway, and DNS Server settings.
- 4. Press ▼ to select the item you want to modify.
- 5. Press  $\blacktriangleleft/\triangleright$  to move the cursor and the press  $\blacktriangle/\blacktriangledown$  to enter the value.
- 6. Press ▼ to highlight **Apply** and press **Mode/Enter**.

### Controlling the projector remotely through a web browser

Once you have the correct IP address for the projector and the projector is on or in standby mode, you can use any computer that is on the same local area network to control the projector.

1. Enter the address of the projector in the address bar of your browser and click **GO**.




2. The remote network operation page opens. This page allows you to operate the projector as if you were using the remote control or control panel on the projector.



- These buttons function the same as the ones on the OSD menus or remote control. See "2. PICTURE menu" on page 48 and "Remote control" on page 11 for details.
- The Menu button can also be used to go back to previous OSD menu, exit and save menu settings.
  - ii. To switch input source, click on your desired signal.

The tools page allows you to manage the projector, configure the Lan control settings and secure access of remote network operation on this projector.



- You can name the projector, keep track of its location and the person in charge of it.
- ii. You can adjust the Lan Control Settings.
- Once set, access to the remote network operation on this projector has been password-protected.
- iv. Once set, access to the tools page has been password-protected.
- After making the adjustments, press the Send button and the data will be saved in the projector.
  - v. Press **Exit** to go back to the remote network operation page. The info page displays the information and status of this projector.





# Shutting down the projector

Press **O** Power and a confirmation message will 1. display prompting you.

> If you don't respond in a few seconds, the message will disappear.

Press **O Power** a second time. The **POWER** 2. indicator light flashes orange, the projection lamp shuts down, and the fans will continue to run for approximately 90 seconds to cool down the projector.





To protect the lamp, the projector will not respond to any commands during the cooling process.

To shorten the cooling time, you can also activate the Quick cooling function. See "Quick Cooling" on page 50 for details.

3. Once the cooling process finishes, a "Power Off Ring Tone" will be heard. The POWER indicator light is a steady orange and fans stop. Disconnect the power cord from the power outlet.



To turn off the power ring tone, see "Turning off the Power on/off ring tone" on page 39 for details.

If the projector is not properly shut down, to protect the lamp, when you attempt to re-start the projector, the fans will run for a few minutes to cool down. Press (1) Power again to start the projector after the fans stop and the POWER indicator light turns orange.

## Maintenance

# Care of the projector

Your projector needs little maintenance. The only thing you need to do on a regular basis is to keep the lens and case clean.

Never remove any parts of the projector except the lamp. Contact your dealer if other parts need replacing.

## Cleaning the lens

Clean the lens whenever you notice dirt or dust on the surface.

- Use a canister of compressed air to remove dust.
- If there is dirt or smears, use lens-cleaning paper or moisten a soft cloth with lens cleaner and gently wipe the lens surface.
- Never use any type of abrasive pad, alkaline/acid cleaner, scouring powder, or volatile solvent, such as alcohol, benzene, thinner or insecticide. Using such materials or maitaining prolonged contact with rubber or vinyl materials may result in damage to the projector surface and cabinet material.

## Cleaning the projector case

Before you clean the case, turn the projector off using the proper shutdown procedure as described in "Shutting down the projector" on page 43 and unplug the power cord.

- To remove dirt or dust, wipe the case with a soft, lint-free cloth.
- To remove stubborn dirt or stains, moisten a soft cloth with water and a neutral pH detergent. Then wipe the case.



Never use wax, alcohol, benzene, thinner or other chemical detergents. These can damage the case.

## Storing the projector

If you need to store the projector for an extended time, please follow the instructions below:

- Make sure the temperature and humidity of the storage area are within the
  recommended range for the projector. Please refer to "Specifications" on page 61 or
  consult your dealer about the range.
- · Retract the adjuster feet.
- Remove the batteries from the remote control.
- Pack the projector in its original packing or equivalent.

## Transporting the projector

It is recommended that you ship the projector with its original packing or equivalent. When you carry the projector yourself, please use the original box or provided soft carry case.

# Lamp information

## Getting to know the lamp hour

When the projector is in operation, the duration (in hours) of lamp usage is automatically calculated by the built-in timer. The method of calculating the equivalent lamp hour is as follows:

For the MP772 ST:

Total (equivalent) lamp hour

= 1 (hours used in Economic mode) + 4/3 (hours used in normal mode)

For the MP776 ST:

Total (equivalent) lamp hour

= 1 (hours used in Economic mode) + 3/2 (hours used in normal mode)

To obtain the lamp hour information:

- Press ▼ to highlight Lamp Settings and press Mode/Enter. The Lamp Settings page displays.
- 3. You will see the **Equivalent Lamp Hour** information displaying on the menu.
- 4. To leave the menu, press **Menu/Exit**.

You can also get the lamp hour information on the **INFORMATION** menu.

## Extending lamp life

The projection lamp is a consumable item that normally can last up to 3000-4000 (for the MP772 ST) or 2000-3000 (for the MP776 ST) hours with proper usage. To keep the lamp life as long as possible, you can do the following settings via the OSD menu.

#### Setting Lamp Mode as Economic

Using **Economic** mode reduces system noise and power consumption by 20%. If the **Economic** mode is selected, the light output will be reduced and result in darker projected pictures.

Setting the projector in **Economic** mode also extends the lamp operation life. To set **Economic** mode, go into the **SYSTEM SETUP: Advanced** > **Lamp Settings** > **Lamp Mode** menu and press  $\blacktriangleleft/\triangleright$ .

#### Setting Auto Power Off

This function allows the projector to turn off automatically if no input signal is detected after a set period of time to prevent unnecessary waste of lamp life.

To set **Auto Power Off**, go into the **SYSTEM SETUP: Basic** > **Auto Power Off** menu and press **◄**/**▶**. The time period can be set from 5 to 30 minutes in 5-minute increments. If the preset time lengths are not suitable for your presentation, select **Disable**. The projector will not automatically shut down in a certain time period.

# Timing of replacing the lamp

When the **Lamp indicator** lights up red or a message appears suggesting it is time to replace the lamp, please install a new lamp or consult your dealer. An old lamp may cause a malfunction in the projector and in some instances the lamp may explode.

Go to http://lamp.beng.com for a replacement lamp.



The LAMP indicator light and TEMPerature warning light will light up if the lamp becomes too hot. Turn the power off and let the projector cool for 45 minutes. If the Lamp or Temp indicator still lights up after turning the power back on, please contact your dealer. See "Indicators" on page 59 for details.



## Replacing the lamp



- To reduce the risk of electrical shock, always turn the projector off and disconnect the power cord before changing the lamp.
- To reduce the risk of severe burns, allow the projector to cool for at least 45 minutes before replacing the lamp.
- To reduce the risk of injuries to fingers and damage to internal components, use caution when removing lamp glass that has shattered into sharp pieces.
- To reduce the risk of injuries to fingers and/or compromising image quality by touching the lens, do not touch the empty lamp compartment when the lamp is removed.


